BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Manatee County Procurement Division has completed a due diligence review and intends to procure Priority Dispatch System-ProQA Software Annual Maintenance from Priority Dispatch Corp. without conducting a competitive solicitation process for the following reason(s):

Manatee County's Public Safety Department requires extending the ProQA software from Priority Dispatch Corp to continue providing efficient emergency dispatch services. Priority Dispatch Corp, a reputable research company, plays a vital role in training and certifying telecommunicators and quality assurance personnel, ensuring their proficiency in dispatching using established emergency protocols. Having utilized Priority Dispatch Corp's protocols for over two decades, Manatee County's hardware is tailored to seamlessly integrate with ProQA software, with the added advantage of the MTPS offering swift responses to medical facilities by streamlining 9-1-1 call questions. While a competitor may offer similar services, Priority Dispatch Corp's protocols stand out for their comprehensive systems approach. Opting for a new provider would entail significant costs, such as purchasing licenses and certifications for personnel, alongside potential disruptions to the Emergency Communications Center's infrastructure. Maintaining the current software not only mitigates expenses but also upholds a standardized approach to emergency calls, safeguarding effective responses in Manatee County. The absence of ProQA software could compromise emergency call handling, emphasizing the crucial need for extending the existing system.
